PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

BuildingUpgrade

Work continues to progress at a rapid rate on the building upgrade. Over the holidays, administration and executive staff are expected to move back into A block. Classes will also moveinto the first of the refurbished classrooms. Work will also commence in B block in one of the existing kitchens. The maths and English staffroom will also be relocated to temporary locations around the school. Early next term it is hoped that parts of the main quadrangle will be available for student use.

Landscaping work and the construction of a new entry to the school from Henry Street will also commence shortly with new electronic gates being installed on the school entry. Electronically operated gates are now commonly installed in schools in the interests of student, staff and visitors afety.

At this stage, the builders are on track for completion of the project by the September school holidays which will also allow year 12 students to use the hall for their HSC exams. It is also planned for year 12 students to use the hall for their upcoming trial HSC exams.

An information booth on the building upgrade will be set up at the upcoming parent teacher interviews.

CyberAbuse

One of the issues which both parents and school deal with on a regular basis is Cyberabuse. Cyber abuse is online behaviour which is reasonably likely to have a seriously threatening, intimidating, har assing or humiliating effect on a person. It is behaviour that threatens to hurt a person socially, psychologically or even physically.

It can take place in various online spaces, like chat rooms, on social networking sites, through emails, messaging apps or on message boards.

Cyberabusecanalsoinvolvearangeofbehaviours, some of which are described as:

Terms like 'trolling', 'cyber hate' and 'cyber harassment' are often used interchangeably to refer to the same type of abuse.

These terms can sometimes be used to describe behaviour that may not necessarily be serious enough to be considered 'cyber abuse'. While some online behaviours and comments might be inappropriate or hurtful, they may not always constitute cyber abuse. Some examples can include:

- sarcastic comments
- insults
- strong opposing views
- off-topic statements that deliberately derail conversation threads

These behaviours may, however, reach the threshold of being considered a form of cyber abuse if there is a larger or serious pattern of targeted online abuse, and therefore likely to have a seriously threatening, intimidating, harassing or humiliating effect on a person.

The Office of the eSafety Commissioner is committed to empowering all Australians to have safer, more positive experiences online. The Office was established in 2015 with a mandate to coordinate and lead the online safety efforts across government, industry and the not-for profit community.

The eSafety Commissioner's website provides resources for parent and students to deal with cyber abuse.

It also provides opportunities for on-line reporting of cyberbullying, image-based abuse and offensive and illegal content.

ATTENDANCE

Senior students - Flexibletimetable

The Senior Student Attendance Kioskis back in operation in the Library

The Kiosk has been introduced for Senior Students to better manage their attendance due to their flexible timetable which allows for late starts and early finishes. The Kiosk operates in the following way for senior students.

- 1. All senior students now appear as automatically whole day absent.
- 2 The 'whole day absent' is removed when the student attends class Period land the roll is marked by the teacher, or Period 2 (if it is their first less on for the day).
 - $Students who have class Period 1 or Period 2 godinectly to class-\underline{donot} signinat the Kiosk.$
- 3. If your first lesson of the day is Period 3 or later you MUST sign in at the Kiosk in the library before 11.10am (this has been corrected as of 24/6/19).
- 4. If you arrive late you must sign in at the front office to remove the whole day absence
 - a Example 1: if your class starts at 9.00am and you arrive at 9.10am you must sign in at the front office NOT the Kiosk.
 - b. Example 2: if your first lesson for the day is Period 3 and you arrive after 11.10am you must signin at the front office or you will remain as whole day absent. The Kiosk will not allow you to signin after 11.10am.
 - c. You missed your first period due to an appointment and arrive in time for the start of Period 2. You must still sign in at the front office to remove the whole day absence as you are technically late.
- 5. If a student's last timetabled lesson is before Period 6 they must scan out using the Kiosk otherwise they are assumed to still be on school premises.
- 6. If the whole year group finishes before the end of Period 6 they are not required to scan out.

 This rule applies on the following days:
 - a Year 11 Thursday A Lunch, Friday A Lunch, Monday B Lunch, Thursday B Period 4
 - b. Year 12 Thursday A & B Lunch

If a senior student leaves the school premises they need to scan in at the Kiosk when they return to school and select the 'Return to School' option. This option will be available to the student if they have submitted their permission note to their relevant Deputy Principal.

It is essential for any senior student who arrives late for their first timetabled lesson, or after 11.10am, to sign in at Student Services. Failure to do so results in their attendance remaining as whole day absent and this will appear on their report as 'unexplained absences'.



Year 8 created a felted component to incorporate into their final product. This is a















Events



The Library has a range of new resources and some great fiction reads. Fiction books are especially well borrowed.






Book of the Week






